## MEMORIAL HOSPITAL EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT RENOVATIONS COMPLETE

On Sunday, July 25, the community was welcomed into Memorial Hospital's newly renovated Emergency Department at its community open house. Hundreds of people attended the rededication hosted at the hospital. In addition to the guided tours of the department led by several members of the Emergency Department staff, the event included a short program with comments by John C. Yanes, Chief Executive Officer, FACHE, John Clark, D.P.M., Chairman of the Board of Directors and Thomas Gallagher M.D., Emergency Services Medical Director.

"Last year, Memorial Hospital experienced 18,000 visits to our emergency department, and 94 percent of the hospital's admissions came through our emergency department. For many in our community the Emergency Department serves as the front door into our hospital," said Yanes.

The newly renovated department has been expanded by 1,000 feet and features 13 new private exam rooms that have been enhanced to provide patients with additional comfort and privacy; a reconstructed physician and

nurses station that improves patient monitoring; as well as a new reception, lobby and vending area that have drastically improved patient flow and comfort. The renovations took place in six phases, allowing the department to remain open throughout the reconstruction process.

According to Yanes, "Recognizing the vital importance of providing top quality healthcare to our community, Memorial Hospital has been committed to transforming its emergency care services. Along with the visible physical

improvements to the department, we have carefully selected a new team of high quality, well trained emergency care physicians who share our commitment to provide the community with excellent emergency services."

Dr. Gallagher emphasized this point, stating that "Memorial's emergency care physicians have been carefully selected based on their skills and training, and are committed to providing the highest level of care to this community for many years to come."

Adding to this, Dr. Clark commented that the event provided an excellent opportunity for the community to visit the emergency department before they needed medical services. Dr. Clark noted that "patient safety and privacy was a top priority in the redesign and the upgraded features of the facility" and highlighted the department's automated medication dispensing system which will allow the staff ready access to medications and expedite care. Dr. Clark added, "the exam rooms that were once separated by curtains are now much

more private given that they are divided by walls, glass and doors." According to Charlotte Urban, Fremont resident and chairman of the Memorial Hospital Foundation Board, "I am extremely impressed with the new facility, it is a great improvement for the hospital, but what I noticed the most from my tour was the friendly, outgoing staff of the department. The staff seemed to truly enjoy their jobs, and were pleased to serve the people of Fremont."

Yanes concluded by thanking the emergency department employees and physicians who continued to provide services throughout the renovation process. "Through careful planning with architects and contractors as well as close collaboration with emergency care staff, this project has now been completed successfully, and will provide the community with a valuable asset long into the future."

## EXTRA MILES AND EXTRA HEART: MHCS ASSOCIATES HELP IN HAITI



THE JANUARY 2010 HAITI EARTHQUAKE WAS A CATASTROPHIC EVENT. THE HAITIAN GOVERNMENT ESTIMATES THAT APPROXIMATELY 230,000 PEOPLE HAVE DIED, 300,000 HAVE BEEN INJURED AND 1,000,000 ARE NOW HOMELESS SINCE THE EARTHQUAKE. AMONG THIS DEVASTATION WERE HAITI'S LARGEST MEDICAL FACILITIES AND MANY OF THEIR HEALTH CARE PROFESSIONALS.

In May, three MHCS associates decided to put their talents to use, and help the people of Haiti. Aleeta Somers-DeHaney, M.D., Cathy Kovaleski, R.N. and Tricia Liebold, surgical technician went for eight days with The University of Miami (FL) Project Medishare, to Port-au-Prince to assist in surgeries in a medical clinic set up in a tent outside the city.

According to Dr. Somers-DeHaney, there was a tremendous need for experienced health-care professionals. "Our team worked twelve to fourteen hour days, sometimes longer. We performed a wide variety of procedures on men, women and children of all ages; no surgery was turned away," she said.

The team performed, at a minimum, 100 surgeries in the eight days they were together, working non-stop to try to keep up with demand.

Sometimes, the conditions became rudimentary, equipment would become unavailable for whatever reason, but that never stopped the procedures.

Although the heat was suffocating – 106 degrees at times – and the conditions were difficult, the Haitians were appreciative of their caregivers. "The people were warm and pleasant," said Dr. Somers-DeHaney. "After everything they had been through, we still saw lots smiling faces."

According to Liebold, "I would go back in a heartbeat; we wanted to make a difference in people's lives, and we did, many times over."

Kovaleski echoed those sentiments. "Once we saw the devastation of the earthquake, we realized the importance that our trip to Haiti, and after our time was complete, we felt the rewards of overcoming the daily challenges and providing the Haitians with much needed health-care services."

## RALPH W. PETERS, M.D.: TO PERFORM FIRST INCISIONLESS PROCEDURE FOR ACID REFLUX IN NORTHWEST OHIO

Memorial Health Care System surgeon Ralph W. Peters, M.D. is currently training for a new incisionless, (EsophyX) reconstructive surgical procedure which will treat gastroesophageal reflux disease (GERD).

Dr. Peters is the first surgeon in northwest Ohio to be trained to perform this procedure; he plans to begin performing the new procedure in October at Memorial Hospital.

According to Dr. Peters, "This incisionless procedure can significantly improve quality of life for our patients. Many reflux patients are unable to drink carbonated or caffeinated beverages or eat rich foods or fruit without triggering reflux. They also sleep sitting up to reduce nighttime reflux. After this new

procedure, clinical trials have shown that most patients can eat and drink foods they avoided for many years. Reflux no longer impacts their life like it previously did."

Incisionless (EsophyX) procedures represents a third generation of surgery. The transition from open surgery to laparoscopy has been regarded as the major advance in surgery in the last two decades. Laparoscopy reduces the skin incisions typical of "open" surgery to only three to five "port" holes. However, laparoscopy still involves the same internal incisions and organ dissection as open surgery.

The EsophyX incisionless procedure, however, is a giant advancement in

minimally invasive surgical techniques, avoiding incisions and dissection altogether. The EsophyX surgical device is introduced into the body, not through an incision, but through a "natural" body orifice, the mouth, and because the procedure is incisionless, there is no visible scar and the risks of adverse effects are reduced.

"Recent studies of the EsophyX incisionless procedure have shown that this surgery can reduce patients' dependency on medications, with 70 percent of patients remaining symptom free after two years and experiencing a dramatic improvement in their quality of life," added Dr. Peters.

# MHCS PATIENT SATISFACTION SCORES CONTINUE TO IMPROVE



OVER THE PAST 12 MONTHS, MEMORIAL HEALTH CARE SYSTEM (MHCS) HAS BEEN CLOSELY MONITORING ITS PATIENT PERCEPTION OF CARE THROUGH A COMPREHENSIVE PATIENT SURVEY PROCESS.

According to MHCS Vice President of Quality and Organizational Development Karla Falls, MSW, LSW, “The surveys are essential as Memorial Hospital evolves from a good, to very good, to excellent healthcare organization.”

Recently, the Emergency and Obstetrics (OB) Departments and the Midwest Pain Treatment Center eclipsed the 90th percentile among similar health care systems. The Emergency Department is in the 94th percentile, while OB and the Pain Treatment Center were in the 99th percentile. These statistics indicate that these MHCS services achieved patient satisfaction scores scored better than 94 and 99 percent of their peers in regards to patients being satisfied with their experience.

“These results are a reflection of the renewed emphasis we have placed on excellence and service in patient care.

Our associates are striving to have our patients and their families leave our facility knowing that they received outstanding service and treatment from highly qualified, experienced professionals,” said Falls.

According to John Yanes, CEO, “Recognizing the importance of having an objective and proven survey process, Memorial Hospital contracted with Press Ganey in 2009 to conduct Memorial Hospital’s patient survey process. We are relying on objective goals and key metrics to quantify our system’s results.”

The patient satisfaction surveys are sent out randomly to MHCS patients by Press Ganey Inc., an independent, nationally recognized company that assists health care facilities in assessing needs of patients and methods of quantifying and improving care and service. Press Ganey processes the results of the

surveys and works directly with hospital personnel on methods of prioritizing and focusing improvements in pertinent areas based on survey results.

“The survey process allows us to identify what we’re doing well while also identifying areas for improvement. There’s always the opportunity to improve service and quality,” said Yanes. “It also facilitates obtaining patient feedback and provides us with valuable information that allows us to understand the patient’s perception of care and service.”

“Our organization will not be satisfied until every department and our facility as a whole has reached the top-tier. We’re committed to develop innovative methods of delivering superior, compassionate care to our patients,” added Falls.

# INTENSIVE CARE UNIT ENHANCED WITH ADDITION OF NEPHROLOGIST AND DIALYSIS SERVICE

In order to serve our communities health care needs, Memorial Hospital continues with the expansion of medical services and is pleased to announce that, Shaukat Rashid, M.D., Zafar Magsi, M.D. and John Ranker, M.D, board certified nephrologists have joined the medical staff at Memorial Hospital.

Consistent with its mission and commitment to improve access to quality care, Memorial Hospital has expanded its inpatient services by providing nephrology services. With the aging population and high incidence of renal failure within its service area, patients with medical conditions requiring nephrology

services may not need to be transferred out of the area for care. "We are very pleased to partner with Memorial Hospital to provide nephrology services to better care for patients close to home," noted Dr. Rashid.

Hospital patients who suffer from diabetes, hypertension or are admitted into an intensive care unit with other serious and complicated conditions often experience renal (kidney) failure. When renal failure occurs, it is often necessary for a patient to undergo kidney dialysis. A nephrologist is a physician who specializes in treating renal conditions and is essential when ordering inpatient dialysis to be administered.

This team of nephrologists will support and work with other members of the medical staff. Nephrologists are often brought in as consultants with critically ill patients. Patients who would have normally been transferred or been admitted to an out of town hospital, will now have the opportunity to stay in Fremont for their inpatient dialysis treatment.

Nephrologists are specialist who work with a patient's attending physician to greatly enhance the care of the patient. Frequently, patients with serious medical conditions are transferred to larger health care facilities when key specialist such as nephrologists are not accessible. However, at Memorial Hospital the likelihood of transfer is reduced as it expands to provide inpatient nephrology services.

## BACK TO SCHOOL BULLYING:

# HELPING YOUR CHILD COPE

As the school year begins, it is a great time for families to prepare their children for a successful year. Throughout a child's scholastic journey, he or she will encounter many triumphs, as well as many setbacks. One major obstacle on a child's path to excellence in academics can be bullying. Teaching a child how to cope with this problem is essential to their success. As the school year begins, keep open the lines of communication with your child. If you think your child may be having trouble with bullying in school, ask questions but maintain a neutral tone and avoid interrupting or judging. Be patient and broach the subject again later if you think you have not gotten all of the information. If your child has been bullied, here are some suggestions to help him or her cope with this difficult problem.

First, help teach your child to avoid being an easy target. Start with posture, voice and eye contact. These can communicate a lot about whether you are vulnerable. Bullies often pick on those kids that appear weak or sensitive. One can practice at home how to demonstrate strong body language. Show your child how to stand proud and with confidence.

Second, bullying can often be deflected with humor or by changing the subject. Practice some witty comebacks in case a bully confronts your child. One example is to respond to bullies by saying, "can you speak up?" and/ or "I can't hear you." This will usually quiet the bully as he or she is not expecting such a response and they will get in trouble if they speak more loudly and are overheard by an adult.

Third, teach your child to take charge of his or her life. We can't control other people's actions but you can stay true to yourself. Think about ways to help your child feel his or her best. Exercise is one way to feel stronger, or other activities such as art, music, computers and writing can also help. The confidence your child may gain from other activities will help him or her ignore the mean kids.

Finally, if bullying persists, contact teachers and guidance counselors to work together to solve the problem. It is important for school personnel to know if there is an ongoing problem and chances are other children are being affected as well. Always remember, offering love and support as well as being a good role model will help your child excel and find success throughout the school year.

# MEMORIAL HOSPITAL FOUNDATION LOAN PROGRAM: UP TO \$50,000 WILL BE AWARDED TO AREA MEDICAL STUDENTS

The Memorial Hospital Foundation Board of Directors recently increased the funding available for the Medical School Student Loan program in hopes of securing more dedicated, locally connected physicians to the area. The loan program now provides funding up to \$50,000 to students in medical school or their residency who will commit to practicing in the community for at least 5 years.

“The demand for talented young physicians on our community is great,” said Howard Stierwalt, M.D., Foundation Board Member and local practicing physician. “We have plenty of local students who have gone on to medical school. This scholarship’s purpose is to provide them with an added incentive to return to the area to practice.”

To be eligible for the loan program, applicants must meet one of the following criteria:

- You must be a resident or former resident in the Memorial Hospital service area,
- You must be a child of active medical staff, or
- You must be a child of a hospital employee with greater than 5 years consecutive service.

“The fund is intended for students who will practice at Memorial Hospital and serve the citizens of our community,” added Dr. Stierwalt. “Memorial Health Care System has a strong tradition of caring for the residents of Fremont and Sandusky County. This scholarship will ensure that people who rely on us for their

medical needs will be in the care of physicians familiar with their community.”

Students who join and serve Memorial Hospital’s medical staff will have the loan forgiven over a 5-year period. Recipients who do not complete their course of study, or choose not to practice at Memorial Hospital will be responsible for the re-payment of the loan with interest.

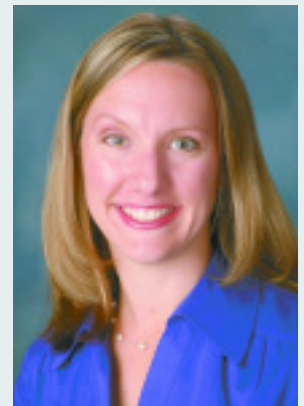
According to Dr. Smith, she became interested in ophthalmology while observing a physician in medical school, and from personal experience as an eye patient.
